

“My Project in 180 Seconds”

In May 2018, the Consortium of Universities for Evaluation Education (CUEE) hosted an inaugural student competition at the Canadian Evaluation Society conference in Calgary Alberta.

- Up to 12 student applicants were selected from among CUEE affiliated universities.
- Students had “180 second” to explain the breadth and importance of their project / research to a non-specialist audience.
- Presenters used PowerPoint slides during their presentations.
- Presentations were in either English or French.
- Students who could not travel to Calgary made presentations via video conference.
- CUEE members moderated the session and gave feedback to students on their presentations.
- CUEE members and audience members judged the presentations in the categories of: organization, clarity and comprehension, and stimulation of thought/interest.
- The top rated student presenter was awarded a certificate and cash prize of \$1,000.
- While this was a competition, it was intended to be fun for both presenters and the audience.
